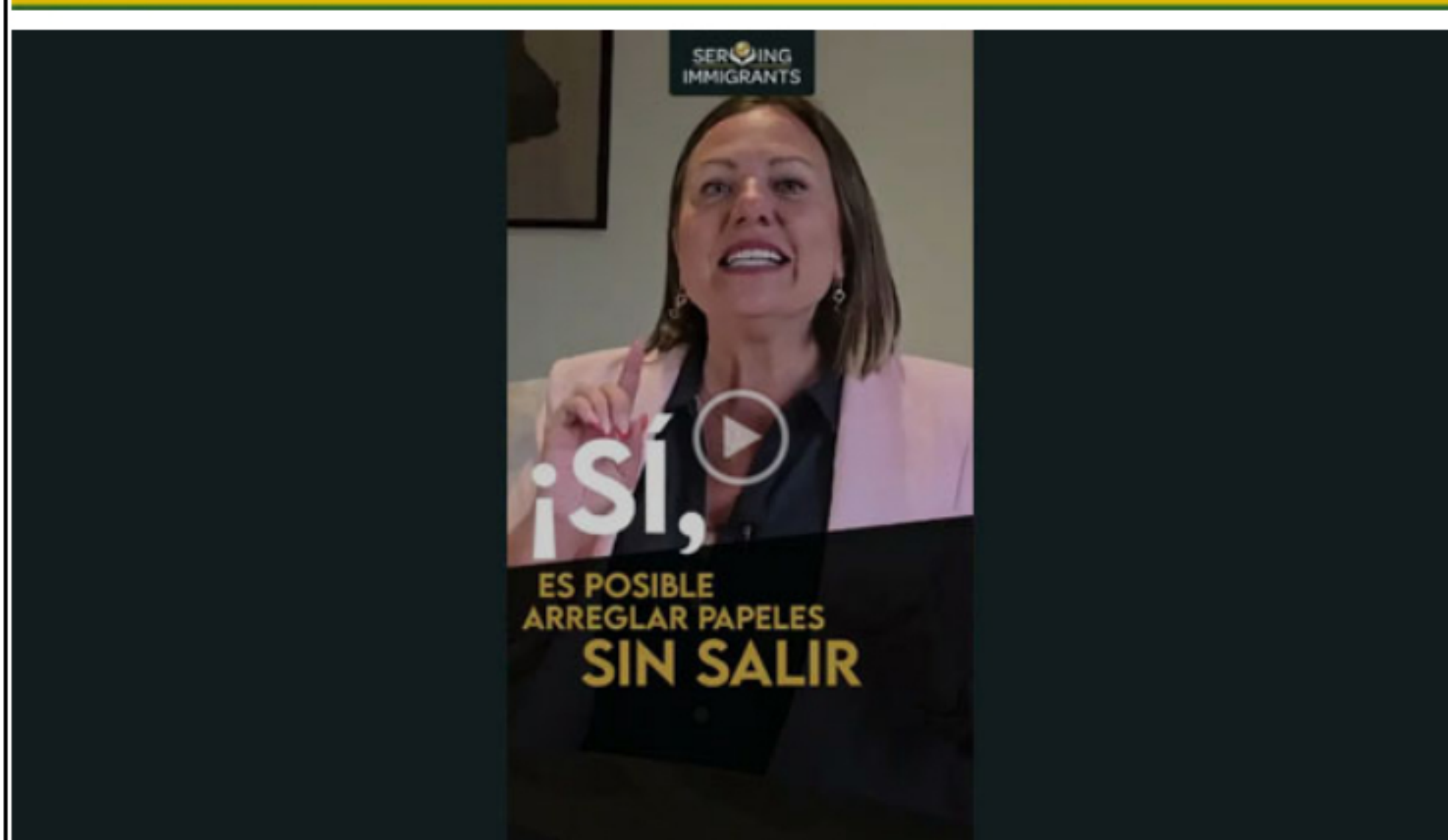

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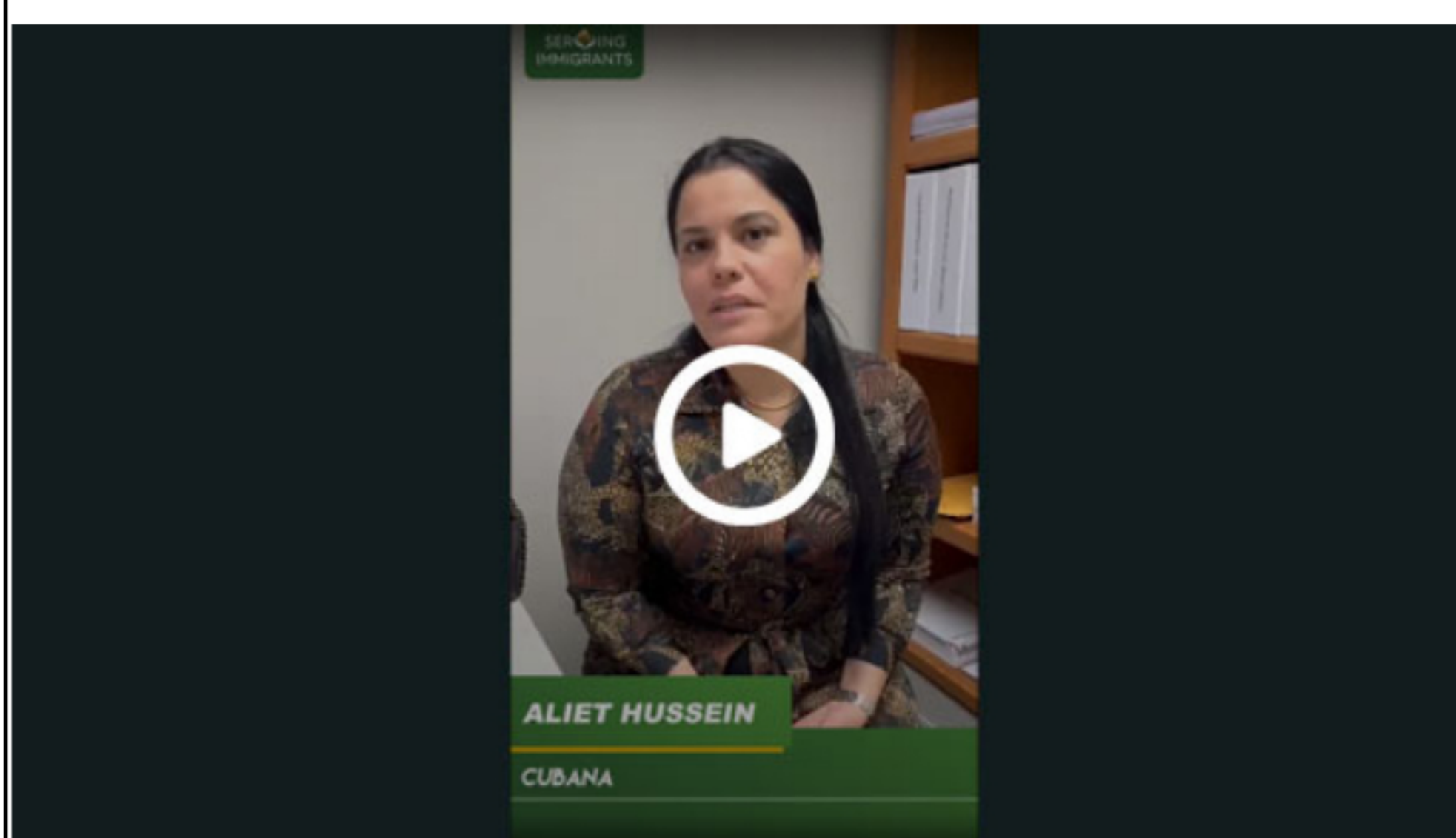

Frequently Asked Questions

Does The Family Member Need To Be In The United States To Be Derivative Of A T Visa?

No, a family member derivative of a T visa does not need to be in the United States to be eligible. Derivative beneficiaries, including spouses, children, and in some cases parents and siblings of the principal applicant, can be outside the United States at the time of application. Once the principal applicant's T visa is approved, derivative family members can apply for the T-2 visa (spouses), T-3 visa (children), or T-4 visa (parents and siblings under 18 if the principal applicant is under 21) from their home countries and then enter the United States with the approved derivative visa. This process allows for family reunification without the need for family members to be present in the U.S. at the beginning of the process.

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
